

Ballot Curing—Fix your rejected ballot by January 8

With the Ossoff/Perdue race still too close to call, it's critical that every ballot count. If you had a mail ballot rejected, or needed to vote provisionally, you can fix this at your local [county elections office](#) by Friday January 8. An Iowa Congressional district just got decided [by 6 votes](#), so if the Ossoff/Perdue race remains close, your vote could determine control of the United States Senate.

Mail-in ballots are sometimes rejected for missing or mismatched signatures. If that happened with yours, you should have been notified, but you can check the [Georgia elections site](#) to confirm. If you voted in person, you may have needed to vote provisionally because of [an improper or missing ID, showing up at the wrong precinct, or your name not being found on the voter rolls](#).

If you fall into either of these categories, you'll have until the end of business hours on Friday, January 8 to fix your ballot so it will count. Just take [your necessary ID](#) to your local [county elections office](#), and they can make sure your ballot counts.
